- Arteta's words emphasized: "It's about what we do on the pitch, today's result, and the next training session." This reflects a deliberate distancing from transfer distractions.

In other words, no hint of frenzy or leak — the manager was intentionally **disconnected for a day** from the transfer chatter, signaling a desire to put team morale first and keep eyes on current objectives.
