Wear Category Float Range Description **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Beautiful condition with very little to no visible scratches or use. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Minor imperfections, minor scratches normally found on edges or high-friction locations. **Field-Tested (FEET)** 0.15-- 0.38 Visible wear and scratches, though the core design stays undamaged. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear, faded colors, and prominent scratches. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Greatly damaged, rusted, or peeling paint; in some cases prized for special "black-grind" looks.

Note: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions incredibly rare and important.

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

In addition cs2skin.com to wear, skins can include unique versions:

- **StatTrak™:** These weapons feature a small digital counter that tracks the variety of confirmed kills the owner makes with that specific weapon.
- **Souvenir Packages:** Dropped throughout official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors), these skins come pre-applied with gold sticker labels representing the teams and map of the specific match.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are categorized into various rarity tiers, which determine how often they appear in weapon cases. Understanding these tiers assists gamers determine the eminence and relative worth of an item.

Rarity Tier Color Code Drop Rate/ Acquisition Method **Customer Grade** White Common drops, base-game weapons. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Somewhat rarer typical drops. **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Basic tier found in weapon cases. **Limited** Purple Unusual case pulls. **Classified** Pink Unusual case drops, typically including complex art work. **Covert** Red Ultra-rare items, generally the flagship weapon of a case. **Special (Exceedingly Rare)** Gold Knives and gloves; the holy grail of unboxing.

It is generally considered as a type of home entertainment instead of a financial investment strategy.

3. The Steam Community Market

For direct purchases, the Steam Community Market provides a safe, regulated community where gamers can buy and sell skins utilizing Steam Wallet funds. Rates here are driven simply by supply and demand.

4. Third-Party Marketplaces

For severe collectors and traders, third-party markets are the favored location. These platforms enable users to trade skins for real-world currency (cash-out choices), often featuring lower fees and a broader variety of peer-to-peer transactions.
