A skin's outside condition does not break down through usage; rather, it is arbitrarily designated when the skin is unboxed or dropped, and it remains static permanently. The five official wear conditions are:

- **Factory New (FN):** Pristine condition with little to no noticeable blemishes.

- **Field-Tested (FEET):** Moderate wear; visible scratches and fading on the weapon's body.

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Extreme wear. The weapon typically looks battered, rusted, or severely faded, though particular skins actually look appealing in this condition (frequently described as "black-grind" or "battle-scarred gems").

2. Weapon Rarities

Skins are categorized into various rarity tiers, which determine their drop rates in-game or from weapon cases:



Rarity Tier Color Code Description **Consumer Grade** White Typical, standard weapon surfaces. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue A little uncommon drops. **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Basic tier discovered in many weapon cases. **Restricted** Purple Higher-tier products, frequently serving as trade-up food. **Classified** Pink Unusual, extremely sought-after weapon surfaces. **Covert** Red The highest standard weapon tier in cases (leaving out knives/gloves). **Remarkable** Gold Exceptionally unusual items, including Knives and Gloves.

Float Values and Pattern Indices

Beyond wear conditions, two concealed technical metrics greatly influence a skin's rate: **Float Value** and **Pattern Index**.

- **Drift Value:** A decimal number between 0.00 and 1.00 that determines the precise wear of a skin. For example, a skin might be "Field-Tested," however if its float is 0.1501, it is best on the border of Minimal Wear and will command a higher price than a Field-Tested skin with a float of 0.37.
- **Pattern Index:** Many skins include procedural generation, suggesting the texture is mapped differently depending upon a seed number (1 to 1000). Famous examples include the *Case Hardened* series, where particular seed numbers produce large amounts of blue on the weapon surface ("Blue Gems"), driving rates up tremendously.

How to Acquire CS2 Skins

There are a number of primary approaches for building a CS2 stock, each with its own benefits and drawbacks:

1. **In-Game Drops:** Simply playing on official or neighborhood servers grants weekly care bundles consisting of weapon drops, graffiti, or cases.
2. **Opening Cases:** Players can acquire keys to open weapon cases. While this offers the thrill of possibly unboxing an unusual knife, the odds are heavily stacked versus the gamer.

5. **Trade-Ups:** Players can sell ten skins of the very same rarity to get one random skin of the next higher rarity tier.

Due to the fact that high-tier CS2 skins can cost countless dollars, the community regrettably attracts bad actors, fraudsters, and phishers. Keep these golden rules in mind:

- **Never click unauthorized login links:** If a website asks you to log in through Steam, confirm the URL to guarantee it is the main Steam domain.
- **Be Careful of API Scams:** Do not log into third-party trading sites that require you to create or share your Steam Web API secret.
- **Use Steam Guard:** Always have two-factor authentication enabled by means of the Steam Mobile Authenticator.
- **Research before purchasing:** Check historic pricing patterns on neighborhood databases before purchasing costly products.
