

A vehicle rarely chooses a convenient place or time to fail. In Arizona, that truth hits harder because distance, heat, and traffic can turn a small roadside problem into a serious disruption very quickly. A dead battery in a shaded parking lot is one thing. A stalled car on the shoulder of Loop 202 in triple-digit heat, or a flat tire on a stretch of road outside Gilbert after sunset, is something else entirely.
