

Westhampton Beach has a way of making itself known without ever trying too hard. The village sits on Long Island's South Shore with the confidence of a place that has seen generations come and go, summer crowds arrive and thin, storms test the shoreline, and local businesses adapt while keeping a stubborn sense of place. It is coastal, yes, but it is not just a beach town. It has a walkable main street, a strong civic memory, a layered architectural character, and a rhythm that changes with the season in ways you can feel on a single afternoon stroll.

For travelers who rush straight to the sand, Westhampton Beach can seem simple. Spend a little time here, though, and a more nuanced picture emerges.
