Questions to Ask About Theme vs Mechanics

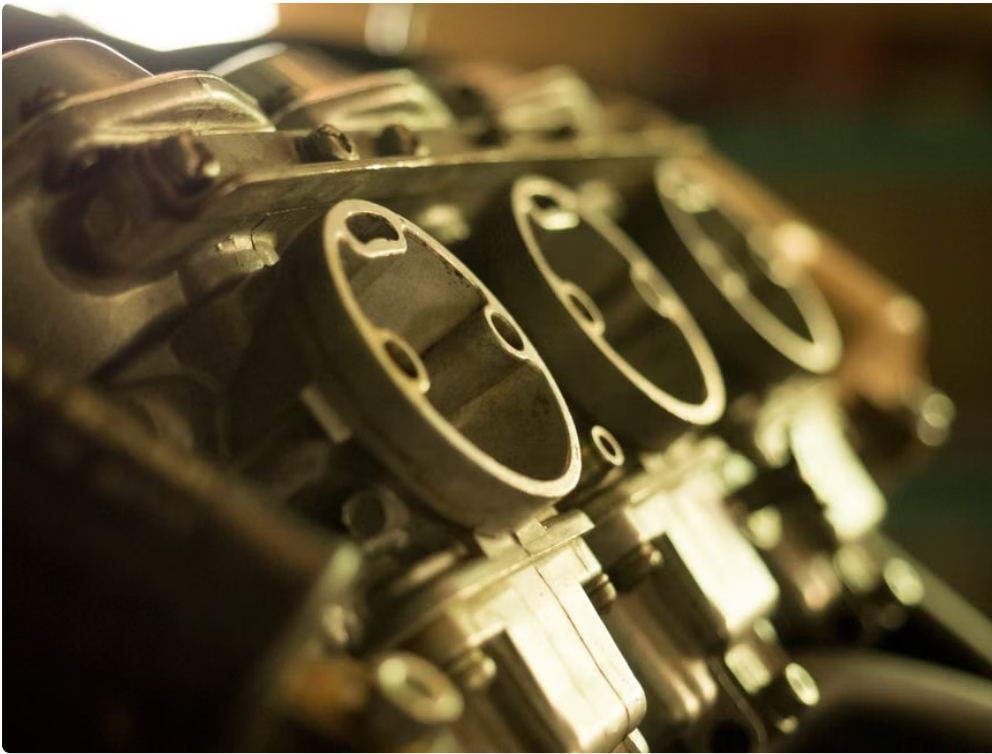
- Does the description explain how the game progresses beyond thematic context?
