Tactical Advantages: Form vs. Function

1. Camouflage Sets

In a game greatly concentrated on stealth, placing, and forest prowling, skin choice matters.

- **Woodland/Forest Camo:** Sets like the *Sylvan* or *Forest Raiders* series aid players blend into tree zone and bushes.
- **Snow Camo:** Essential for tundra biomes. Using bright red in the snow makes a gamer a walking bullseye, whereas white-themed skins provide vital concealment.

2. Night Advantages

Evening in *Rust* can be pitch black. Clever gamers use particular categories of skins to keep an edge when the sun goes down:

- **Glow-in-the-Dark (GITD):** Items like the *From Hell* door or weapons with radiant iron sights enable gamers to intend and browse inside dark bases without turning on a flashlight (which gives away position).
