Tactical Advantages: P2W (Pay-to-Win) in Rust?

While Facepunch strictly prohibits pay-to-win mechanics that modify damage or health, certain skins supply undeniable *tactical* advantages. These items typically surround on a gray area, frequently causing community debates.

- **Night Visibility:** Glowing iron sights on weapons allow gamers to aim accurately in pitch-black environments without needing a flashlight attachment, which would otherwise distribute their position.
- **The "P2W" Snow Gear:** Certain clothing skins mix flawlessly into snow biomes, making the wearer almost invisible to enemies scanning the horizon from a distance.
- **Transparent Doors:** In the past, specific glass or wire-mesh door skins inadvertently allowed gamers to browse them before patches repaired the openness issues, showing how fragile the balance of cosmetic design can be.
