Beyond these standard tiers, items can also bear the **StatTrak**™ innovation, which digitally tracks the variety of verified eliminates a player makes with that particular weapon, generally driving the rate up significantly.

The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

Among the most remarkable aspects of CS: GO skins is that no 2 similar weapons look exactly the same. Every weapon is designated a **Float Value** ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which determines its physical condition or outside wear.

The wear value is permanently locked to the item when it is produced and does not break down even more through usage.

The Five Exterior Conditions:

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Pristine, flawless surface with very little to no scratches.
2. **Very Little Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Minor acnes or slight scuffs, typically only visible upon close inspection.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Visible wear and scratches, balancing cost and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Considerable paint cracking and heavy wear patterns.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily degraded, in some cases looking rusted, weathered, or almost entirely stripped of paint.

Note: Certain skins-- such as the popular AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states incredibly unusual and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital assets operates similarly to a real-world stock exchange. Costs are determined simply by supply and need, affected by a number of essential aspects:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports professional starts using a particular skin during a significant competition, the need for that item typically spikes overnight.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping specific older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins included within them-- diminishes, causing costs to increase naturally with time.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell 10 weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, burning items out of blood circulation and permanently modifying supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations present brand-new thematic collections, temporarily flooding or moving the focus of the marketplace.

Popular Weapon Families to Collect

For gamers aiming to start a collection, particular weapon households have achieved legendary status within the community due to their artistic design and status.

- **The Asiimov Series:** Instantly recognizable by its sci-fi, white, black, and intense orange geometric visual. Available on the M4A4, AWP, P90, and P250.
