

Overview of Windsor, ON's Weather and Best Times to Visit

Windsor, Ontario has a weather pattern shaped by its position on the Detroit River, its closeness to Lake Erie, and the broader Great Lakes climate that influences much of southwestern Ontario. Because the city sits at one of Canada's southernmost points, it often feels milder than many other Ontario destinations, but it still experiences four distinct seasons with noticeable shifts in average temperatures, precipitation, humidity, and wind.
