

What a Typical Windsor Visitor Budget Covers

A realistic **travel budget** for **Windsor, Ontario** should cover a few essential **daily expenses**: **accommodation costs**, **food and dining**, local transportation, and entry to **local attractions**. If you are doing **budget travel**, the final number can change a lot depending on whether you stay near **Downtown Windsor**, choose the **Riverfront area**, or travel in **peak season** when **seasonal rates** rise.
