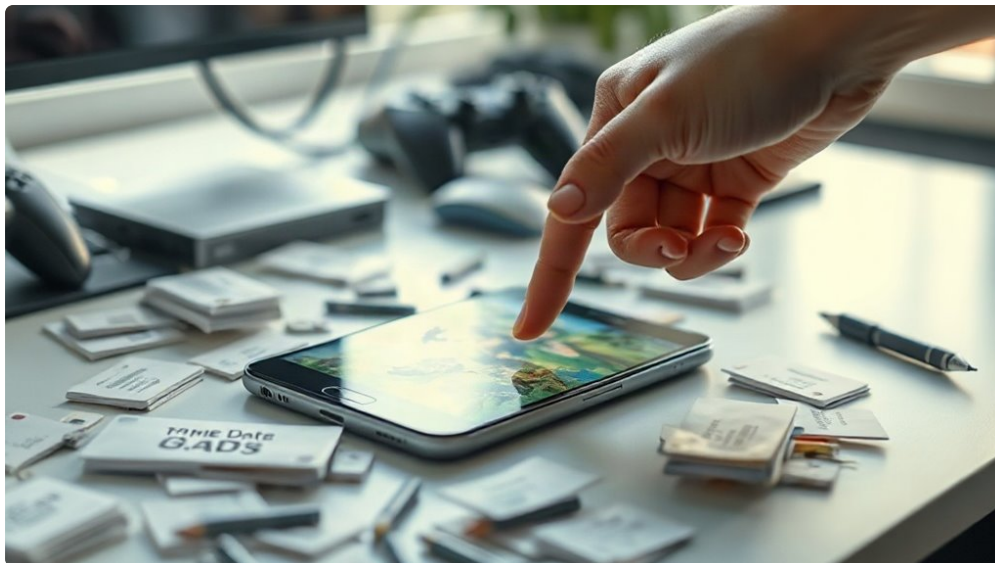

- Review permissions and app behavior after setup, not only before it.
- Read version notes and Android needs instead of choosing a file by name alone.
- Keep important data backed up before updates, reinstalls, or other changes.
- Check premium feature claims with the source, file details, and your device in mind.

Premium Feature Claims: Why the Details Matter
