

A good plumber is not just the person who shows up with a wrench, a flashlight, and the calm expression of someone who has seen worse under a sink. A plumber is part of a larger trade world where water, heat, air, drains, pumps, fixtures, appliances, and sometimes electrical connections all meet in the same cramped utility closet.
