

Batavia, NY Weather Overview

Batavia, NY sits in Genesee County in Western New York, right in the corridor between Rochester, NY and Buffalo, NY. That position gives the city a true Upstate New York climate: four clear seasons, frequent changes in cloud cover, and a steady mix of rain, snow, and temperature swings. Because Batavia is inland compared with both Rochester and Buffalo, its local climate is shaped by regional systems moving across the Genesee Valley and by broader Great Lakes weather patterns, especially the Lake Ontario influence.

For residents and visitors, the key to understanding the weather in Batavia is recognizing how quickly conditions can change. From April to June: Spring Transition

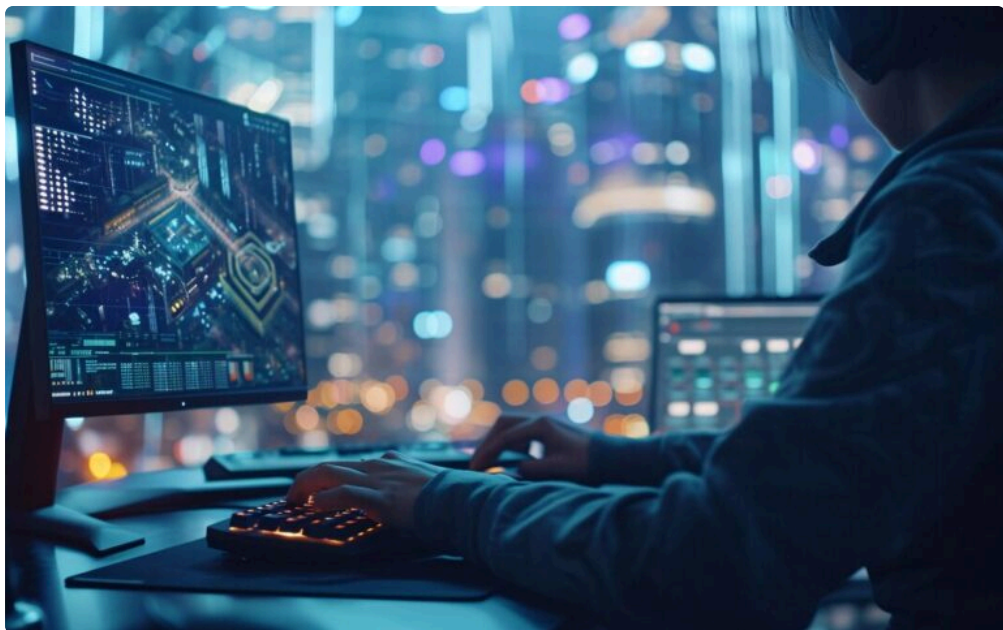
Weather-Smart Advice For Locals and Travelers
