

The back of the house has a different job

The front of a property gets judged from the street. The patio is a place you occupy. Everything changes when you become the audience from within. Nobody is grading the back yard from the street. The only test is whether anybody wants to sit there. All of which is a long way of saying the back yard is its own project. The front and the back rarely get solved by the same fixtures, and one light [landscape lighting installation](#) over the door is the usual result of not planning it. Two spaces, two separate sets of requirements to satisfy.

What actually drives people inside

A single glaring bulb will empty a patio faster than no light at all. Look at a bright source and your eyes stop adapting to the dark. Aim for light you notice the effect of but not the source of.

The overhead layer

The reason overhead strings feel right is that they make a boundary. A patio without them has no top to it. Add a canopy of light and the area has walls it did not have. Warm and dim is the setting that works, since bright overhead light is the wrong mood entirely. None of this is a question of spending more, since most of what separates a good patio from a harsh one is where things point.

Layers, the way a designer thinks about it

A patio works best with a few layers rather than one solution. Overhead, low, and accent. Put them on separate controls if you can, since you want a bright option and a quiet one.

The business version

A restaurant patio has to solve this every single night. Bistro and string lighting over an outdoor dining area makes the space usable and inviting after sunset. Nothing changes technically. Only the reason does.

Lighting stretches the season

An unlit patio stops being usable in October. With light, the space is available whenever the weather is. In the Upstate there are plenty of mild nights well outside summer, and most of them happen after dark. The lighting is what converts them into usable time.

Something worth knowing about color

Anybody who has sat under a bright outdoor light in July has shared it with insects. Insects are drawn more strongly to the cool end, which is a second argument for keeping patio light warm. It helps. It is not a solution. But it is a free consideration when choosing the setting. Worth adding: whatever runs along the roof edge above should match, so the space reads as one thing.

Getting your outdoor space planned

Patio lighting has to be planned in the actual space, preferably at night. What is permanent outdoor lighting?

Permanent outdoor lighting is a fixed LED system installed along a building's roofline, eaves and architectural lines and left in place all year. The LEDs sit in a track that is color matched to the trim, and the system is controlled from a smartphone app. It replaces the seasonal strands that go up and come down each year.

Are the lights noticeable during the day?

The track is color matched to the trim or fascia and mounted tight along the edge of the roofline, so it is designed to stay discreet in daylight and read as part of the house rather than as decoration.

Does EverCrest Lighting install Christmas lights?

Yes. EverCrest Lighting installs Christmas and holiday lighting, and also installs permanent LED systems that handle holiday colors from an app. On traditional holiday lighting, EverCrest Lighting handles takedown at the end of the season and off season storage.
