Since digital skins abstract the principle of "real cash," players often spend even more than they meant. Dealing with virtual products delicately can cause significant financial losses if users continuously buy more skins on the Steam Market to fund their gambling practices.

- **Never click random links:** Scammers often use sponsored search results page or impersonate professional esports players to promote fraudulent phishing sites.

- **Set stringent financial limits:** Treat gambling simply as a type of entertainment with a fixed spending plan, rather than a trustworthy way to earn money.
- **Safeguard your Steam account:** Enable Steam Guard Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and never log into your Steam account on unproven third-party domains.
